We started with one of the greatest assets this country has: its people. In five years, we partnered with over forty civil society organizations and had the privilege of working alongside with some of Romania's brightest people. Together, we shared our professional expertise, vision, passion, and dedication to design and implement projects that capitalize on the untapped opportunities Romania offers to address some of the country's most severe problems.

As part of our strategic rethinking process, during 2014 we worked to articulate program strategies to achieve the Foundation's mission and provide a clearer framework for funding. After thorough assessments, followed by consultations with partners and stakeholders, we have defined three strategic priorities for our programs: moving

towards a vibrant rural economy, boosting economic growth opportunities through technological innovation, and fostering civic engagement and a strong civil society.

We seek to contribute to the economic development of rural areas by supporting small farmers in making the transition from subsistence farming to a profitable business, and by promoting ecotourism and the responsible management of ecotourism destinations; we helieve that both these interventions are grounded in emerging market opportunities. Together with our partners, we reflect on the work that is done at the community level, on what works and why, and take those lessons and transform them into experiential educational opportunities for youth. We believe that this process represents the true sustainability of our actions, providing relevant options for future generations.

We are exploring the most significant interventions that would capitalize on the great economic potential technology and innovation possess, to determine how to assist Romania's talent grow and become competitive. We're still

And last but not least, we know that Romanians themselves are essential to the positive change we seek to generate. We work to help communities become actively engaged in shaping their future, encourage personal philanthropy, and support civil society in bringing relevant community issues onto the public agenda.

chance to gain access to quality education; people donating time, money and expertise to benefit their communities

ABOUT RAF

The Romanian-American Foundation (RAF) was established in 2009, as legacy of the Romanian-American Enterprise Fund (RAFF). Created in 1994 by the United States Congress under the Support for Eastern European Democracy (SEED) Act, RAFF was a public-private partnership which pionered a combination of investment and development activities that proved very successful in the Romanian market place. At the end of its amandate, RAFF returned half of the initial grant to the US State Department, the remaining half and registered profits constituting the endowment for an in-perpetuity Foundation.

RAF's current endowment of over \$70 million is expected to exceed \$100 million in the coming years.

How We Work

ABOUT RAF

Our work goes far beyond grant making. We act more like a venture fund seeking social investments in initiatives that have strong potential for replication and a broad impact.

We proactively search, support and further develop initiatives, through grants and program-related investments matched with ongoing technical assistance.

We partner with leaders and innovators that have a long-term commitment and who share our passion and mission to affect change in the fields we consider strategic.

In general, programs are funded by invitation only. However, we are open to discuss ideas for potential initiatives from eligible organizations. All program proposals go before RAF's Board of Trustees for approval.

RAF's programming in Romania is exclusively implemented through the funding of NGOs.



- Partnerships: we seek to form strong partnerships with local communities, public authorities or other organizations to increase the impact of RAF-supported projects.
- Leadership: our partners are established organizations, with a relevant track record sound operations and policies and permanent staff. We invest primarily in people since they are the ones able to make ideas grow.
- Replicability: we seek to support projects with high potential for replication and visible impact.
- Reciprocity: partners and grantees are expected to contribute their own resource

 (not processify money) to the project.



Based on our strategic priorities, we identify partners and ideas by proactive solicitation. We carefully evaluate each of them, using a clear set of criteria. We are also open to receiving proposals at any moment.



We work closely with each selected partner to develop a pilot for the idea. Our aim is to develop innovative ideas, with the potential to scale and leverage resources.



We test the idea for sustainability and impact.







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Interest Areas and Strategic Priorities

The Romanian-American Foundation is an active and innovative grant maker leading a collaborative search towards strategic interventions in three programmatic areas: entrepreneurship – which we consider essential to society, education – which we perceive as a requisite instrument in all of our endeavors, and community development – for any idea, no matter how brilliant, has little chance of being translated into facts without a passionate leader and a community to support it.



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Rural Development Priority

Seeking to reduce the disparities between rural and urban areas, RAF uses its entrepreneurship and education programs as tools in developing coherent interventions aimed at capitalizing on the great potential these areas have, both in terms of human capital and natural and cultural resources. Romania still has pristine landscapes and picturesque villages where people are keepers of local traditions and identity. In the rural economy, we identified two niches where what may appear as weaknesses can be turned into market-based opportunities. Small farmers are in a very good position to respond to the growing demand for local produce, while ecotourism could responsibly capitalize on the charm of Romania's countryside, the beauty of its sceneries, local traditions, and diversity of flora and wildlife.

Through our interventions we ultimately seek to contribute to the creation of vibrant rural communities, where people choose to live and make a living.

Our strategy involves two main issues: small farmers and ecotourism We address these issues in a holistic approach of entrepreneurial, educational, and community development programs.

The Rural Entrepreneurship Program

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The program tested a series of interventions aimed at enabling economically active small and medium-sized farmers transition from semi-subsistence agriculture to a profitable business. Together with our partners, we assisted small farmers to access capital from local micro-lending institutions and European lines of funding, and piloted different forms of association to help them gain access to markets, by developing producers associations.

The Rural Entrepreneurship program supported four pilot cooperatives, which help over 45 farmers to better capitalize on their products, so that they can ensure a sustainable future for their business. The farmers associations can thus act as engines for local economic development.

Outcomes so far

Over 1,000 small farmers in 40 local communities attended training sessions in essential skills such as how to register as rural producers, how to access available financial resources and to how better organize themselves as entrepreneurs.

Our partners Fundația Civitas, Fundația pentru Dezvoltarea Societății Civile, and Fundația Centrul de Mediere și Securitate Comunitară facilitated the creation of four local cooperatives, in Cluj, lași and Ilfov. Together, more than 45 farmers (vegetable growers and honey producers) sell up to 60% of their production through the cooperatives.

Farmers in the program were able to access big retail chains, such as Kaufland, Mega Image, Auchan and Profi

Some of the cooperatives went beyond collectively selling their production: they use their collective power to negotiate with suppliers; they are also searching for solutions to improve their productivity.

In order to encourage replication and scalability, one of the partners (Civitas) trained an additional number of 12 Local Action Groups and 6 Non-Governmental Organizations on how to use the intervention model to assist communities by facilitating the cooperative development process. It is expected that they will further apply for European funds to scale up, in a consortium supported by RAF with cash-flow loans and additional grants, as needed.

As a result of engaging in a permanent dialogue with relevant public authorities, we were able to share our experiences from the program to help shape public policies addressing rural development in Romania. Small Farmers

Cooperativa Agricolă Lunca Someșului Mic

In Cluj County, 16 farmers from Apahida, Jucu, and Bonţida decided to create the cooperative Lunca Someşului Mic. Association in agriculture is a solution for local economic development through entrepreneurial linitiatives. Assisted by Fundaţia Civitas, they sailed through the troubled waters of a start-up and surmounted the difficulties encountered, and today they deliver their produce to large retailers, such as Kaufland and Profi.

The creation of the association included four distinct stages:

- Seeking and selecting members
- 2. Legally registering the cooperative and developing a business plan
- 2. Legany registering the cooperative and developing a business pie
- Implementing the business plan: delivering produce (current stage)
 The Cooperative becomes self-sustainable and functions without support from Fundatia Civitas



"Getting Kaufland to sign the contract was easy. The difficulties came when we had to deliver a constant flow of quality produce on time. We were not prepared to operate within these parameters, but we did not give up. We had to go back and rethink our management plan. Today I am glad that we were given a second chance."

Romanian-American Foundation Study Tour

As part of our commitment to contribute to the development of rural economy, RAF facilitates learning experiences form various models, aimed at enhancing our grantees' capacity.

In February 2014, the Romanian-American Foundation organized a study tour to the New York and Pennsylvania areas, inviting representatives of our partners in the Rural Entrepreneurship – Small Farmers Program to get a closer look at the major characteristics of the "farm-to-table" movement and the models developed to streamline the process in which food produced in small-scale farms reaches the consumer. In the U.S., the basis of the American regional food systems is the food hub. The visit was an opportunity for the participants to better understand how the food hub model works and determine to what degree it can be replicated in Romania, in order to improve market access for small farmers and to strengthen their position in the food chain.

The tour included visits to several facilities in New York and Philadelphia areas, as well as meetings with NGOs working in the field and representatives of the United States Department of Agriculture, who explained how local authorities in the U.S. adopted plans to support the development of regional and food systems.

The visited sites included: Farm-to-Table Co-Packers, Philadelphia Wholesale Produce Market, Common Market, and Reading Terminal Market.

The study tour was a great learning experience, providing participants with valuable insight on the way food hubs operate, the

The food hub is defined as an entity which manages aggregation, storage, processing, distribution, and trading of local and regional produce, but also provides technical assistance to its customers, the small farmers, on vital aspects of their business: marketing, farm management, start-up and business incubation. The two main functions of food hubs are those of local food aggregator and selling point.

Developing Ecotourism in Romania

Using the lessons learned from our previous programs, together with our partners and with input from other stakeholders, a new program strategy has been designed around the concept of ecotourism. We see ecotourism as a vector and engine for local development, a seed bed for small businesses and local entrepreneurs who can capitalize on the natural and cultural resources to bring prosperity to their regions.

An ecotourism destination is a micro-region with remarkable natural and cultural assets, where sustainable tourism can be enjoyed, offering integrated experiences with minimal environment impact, by aggregating a network of complementary ecotourism service providers under the same common marketing and development strategy.

Our vision is that in 2024, Romania will have 15 to 20 functional ecotourism destinations that will contribute in a significant way to the well-being of their communities and the environmental protection of the respective areas. This will make Romania recognized as an ecotourism destination.

We worked with our partners to select ten micro-regions that have the potential to develop into ecotourism destinations. We then invited well-established local organizations to take part in a competitive

Education in Rural Areas

Teach for Romania attracts exceptional graduates of prestigious universities in Romania and abroad and prepares them to teach in schools from poor or rural areas, which other teachers try to avoid. For a period of two years, teachers bring innovative teaching into the classroom, building the knowledge and skills of their students and, even more important, instilling values and the motivation for education and personal growth.

The program is part of a global network of organizations going back 20 years, and present in 36 countries. In 2014, the first Leadership Summer Academy organized by Teach for Romania prepared 19 young professionals to become teachers. During their training, assisted by tutors and other educational experts, they taught classes throughout the summer for over 180 children a disadvantaged community in the village of Tāflungeni, Brasov County.

On September 15, 2014 the first generation of Teach for Romania teachers initiated their activity of serving over 2,700 students in 13 schools in the central and Southern part of Romania. With support from tutors and mentors, the teachers bring a positive change, improving children's achievements and attitudes in the classroom, in school and in the community.

Education in Rural Areas

Enterprise Challenge

This program is a cross-cutting intervention, serving the general scope of building awareness of entrepreneurship and an entrepreneurial mindset, which we consider of utmost importance.

Entrepreneurs are key players in the market economy. Junior Achievement România develops entrepreneurial education programs that inspire and prepare youth to build a career and become successful by allowing them to acquire a set of skills essential for their personal and professional development. JAP programs prepare teachers to deliver hands-on entrepreneurial education classes, while the Company of the Year competition gives students the unique experience of starting their own business, allowing them to get a taste of what it is like to be real

The Story of the Young Entrepreneurs from the Miroslava Agricultural High School

Andi Andriucă and his colleagues, all students at the Mihail Kogălniceanu Agricultural High School in Miroslava, laşi County, proved that good ideas, and the courage to think them through and make them happen can be the key to success. Together, Andi and his team started the Merry Animals Farm, and participated in the 2012 Junior Achievement' competition "Company of the Year". They won the Investment of the Year Prize, offered by the Romanian-American Foundation. Proving entrepreneurial talent, a new business idea emerged. Andi and his colleagues invested the \$1,500 prize in acquiring a new asset the pony Arnadeus. The team found a smart way of growing their business and went on to open a horse paddock and a riding club on the school premises, this new business idea resulting in their winning the 2014 "Company of the Year" Award.

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Technology & Innovation Priority

RAF acknowledges the vast economic potential technology and innovation possess, and is exploring the most significant interventions that would help improve the future environment in Romania.

The technology and innovation sectors represent 16 % of the Romanian GDP and have been declared a priority by the government to support sustained future economic growth. Contributing to the betterment of the ecosystem could considerably advance its position in the economy, while providing greater numbers of jobs, improved services to citizens, and new products to market.

There is tremendous opportunity for technology and innovation to become the primary motor of the Romanian economy, capitalizing on local talent and an effervescent environment. We believe that a closer and systematic interaction among university-based stakeholders (students and professors), entrepreneurial communities, industry, and investors would bring added value to the entire market and its players.

We seek cross-sector collaboration and coordination in order to achieve, fully realize, and accelerate the potential of Romania through technology and innovation. In order to meet the stated goals, we are currently in discussions with a wide spectrum of interested individuals, entrepreneurs, corporations, and academics to assist in collectively identifying the most valuable area within the technology and innovation ecosystem to create change with the highest possible level of positive impact.

Through pilot programs and consultations with key stakeholders, RAF is realigning its strategy that will shape future programming in this field.

To date, our interventions included: The Romanian Commercialization Assistance Program (RICAP), ARTIE Fellowships, Innovation Labs, Science Curriculum Reform, and Improving Mathematics Education.

We also encourage Community Foundations to run local STEM funds.

The Romanian Innovation Commercialization Assistance Program (RICAP) is designed to act as a bridge between Romanian companies that create innovative technologies and international markets. Most innovative technology entrepreneurs have the technical know-hov to make great products but lack the capital, business expertise and connections to bring their ideas to market and become profitable. The program created a local network of innovative companies and mentors and linked them to a global network, allowing for Romanian innovators to benefit from both the guidance and support of local mentors, and U.S.-based commercialization advisors. It is also a great opportunity for international stakeholders to become acquainted with Romanian talent in technological novelty.

The RICAP program is implemented by Centrul Român pentru Inovație în Dezvoltarea Locală (CRIDL) in partnership with Laria Institute. CRIDL manages a local network of innovative companies and mentors and introduces them to Lartás 'network-centric' methodology, a commercialization practice that for the past 20 years helped thousands of innovators.

The program brought together teachers from the university and K-12 systems who worked to make a positive change in mathematics education in schools. In 2014, the program focused on offering teachers support to improve the evaluation of students' competencies criteria, as well as on increasing the Romanian students' interest in mathematics.

The number of students enrolled in the "Future Olympics" competition quadrupled in four years, nearing 19,000 in 2014. The best 188 students attended the 2014 summer campin Câmpduing Muscel, where, assisted by 52 teachers, they took part in the final stage of the math competition and various personal development activities, being exposed to novel ways of employing mathematics in real life.

Science Curriculum Reform

Teachers play a key role in ensuring the success of all the educational programs developed by RAF. We believe that once we find the best solutions to support teachers, we will see a significant improvement in the teaching and learning methods in schools, which will increase both the impact and sustainability of our investment.

For years, the methodology of teaching Physics in Romanian schools relied more on theory and less on experiential learning, which made the subject very difficult to assimilate by students. Lab experiments were scarce to none, and the cryptic formulas taught made it hard to imagine that the notions introduced in class actually made reference to phenomena encountered in everyday life.

In the case of the Physics curriculum, the change came from within, from a group of passionate teachers. The Reform of Teaching Physics project started in 2011, when these teachers showed that Physics could be made attractive to students if they reformed the instruction method and supported students to better understand phenomena rather than just memorize formulas. Their approach was developed and substantiated to respond to the newest trends in learning Physics (such as inquiry-based learning, where starting from a powerful question the students are supported to find answers themselves by using experiments and by working in teams). Applying these methods in class helps children understand Physics, and even more — it teaches them to think and allows them to acquire a set of skills they can further use for the rest of their lives.

This inquiry-based teaching method can be applied in teaching other subjects.

Civic Engagement Priority

Citizens play a key role in social change. The type of lasting, significant change RAF seeks to generate is unimaginable without the active participation of citizens. The society we envisage is one where people identify issues, seek solutions, and ultimately solve problems, where people think beyond their own self and understand the importance of contributing to the overall well-being of their communities. Shifting the mindsets is challenging, due to a variety of factors. The youth lack role models and the opportunities to learn active citizenship are limited. Civic participation and philanthropy, which RAF sees as core societal values, are not yet cultural norms in Romania.

On the other hand, there are positive signs that a new generation of active citizens is in the making: more and more people volunteer, young people are increasingly involved in civic life and contribute to solving problems, make donations, vote and hold officials accountable, proving that they adhere to democratic values.

Community Foundations Matching Fund for Individual Donors

Easy Giving

The Easy Giving program is a tool for philanthropy, offering donors the possibility to use the Donatier or platform to make financial contributions to causes they believe in. Developed by Asociatja pentru Relaţii Comunitare în partnership with three mobile phone carriers and six banks, the donation platform is a simple and transparent way for individuals to donate, either by text message (SMS) or direct debit.

Besides providing the donation platform, the program

shapes an infrastructure for philanthropy, addressing both the donors and the fundraisers. From teaching people how to donate wisely to trainings for organizations to attract recurrent donors by direct debit, and public awareness aimed at stimulating a philanthropic behavior, the program helps an increasing number of individuals make financial contributions to support civil society organizations address issues that are relevant for their communities.

STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Fund



Seeking to stimulate local communities to become more involved in providing attractive learning opportunities for children, RAF started a pilot program to setup an educational fund in areas of STEM, in partnership with four Community Foundations. The Community Foundations engage local donors to contribute financially and select projects, while RAF provides operational support and one-to-one matching of funds raised from the local donors.

Innovative ways of learning for students will make them realize that science is not a remote and complicated issue but an interesting discovery in their everyday life. Discovering the beauty of science might lead students towards choosing a career in innovation and technology.

Youth Debate Program



ARDOR received an initial small grant to consolidate the 5th annual Youth Debate Competition. This is a program for students who want to get acquainted with debate within an extra-curricular educational set-up. In the 2013-2014 school year, over 200 schools participated in the competition, a 30% increase from the previous year. At the same time, the grant gave ARDOR the opportunity to research how to expand the use of debate in schools. The findings of the research led to the development of a three-year program, funded with a new grant, contracted in December 2014. This second program will encourage teachers and students to use debate during classes, as an optional course or as a method in subjects such as history or civics. Teachers will receive support and materials to facilitate the adoption

The grant will also support the further development of the Youth Debate Competition, as well as the capacity of the organization.

IMPACT Clubs Story

In 2002 in the Jiu Valley there were hardly any development opportunities for youth. The IMPACT program started from the idea of ending civic apathy and encouraging people to work together to bring positive changes to their communities.

Through community involvement, IMPACT contributed to the development of over 6,000 youth and children, guided by over 300 volunteer IMPACT Club leaders.

From a single IMPACT Club, the program managed to expand the network in 28 counties in the 2014 -2015 school year, in approximately 150 schools in Romania, and worked yearly with over 2,000 youths and 300 volunteer teachers.

Each year, the IMPACT Clubs work on nearly 200 projects, benefiting approximately 35,000 people: children, youth, adults and senjors alike. Program Related Investments (PRIs)

In addition to grants, the Romanian-American Foundation uses Program Related Investments (PRIs) in the form of soft loans or repayable grants to support the cash flow of qualified Romanian charitable organizations whose activity is in line with RAFE mission

RAF was the first foundation in Romania to offer these innovative philanthropic

RAF's use of PRIs to provide bridge loans has broadened the ability of our partners to gain access to European Union funds.

Although regarded as a high risk investment by mainstream financial institutions, our records show that the portfolio quality is outstanding, with no single day of delayed payments registered. We started offering PRIs in 2011 and since then the following borrowers have paid back the loans in full: Asociația Alternative Sociale, Centrul pentru Educație Economică și Dexostrater în România, Fundația pentru Dezvoltarea Societății Civile, and Fundația Motivation România.

The loan received from the Romanian-American Foundation helped us access EU funding to launch one of NESST's biggest projects, in partnership with Fundajid Civitas. This allows us to create two community social enterprises in Timispaara: acultural center and a fair trade café that will employ 13 disadvantaged people. This instrument supported NESST to advance its vision to create new jobs and social enterprises with significant impact."

RAF House is a symbol of our long-term commitment to contribute to Romania's development. It is the epicenter of our work, from where ideas and solutions for a better Romania propagate throughout the country.

We take pride in calling this remarkable historical building with significant architectural value our home, and in sharing it with people and organizations whose work lends a hand to building a better Romania. From the onset, we envisaged the ground floor rooms as a gathering space for our partners and foil society organizations whose activity matches our scope of work. The event rooms in the RAF House are offered free of charge, as an informal portfolio of in-kind grants, which has proven extremely useful for NGOs. Each year, the number of events grows and the meeting themes broaden.

In addition to being the Foundation's headquarters, the RAF House also hosts the offices of three other organizations: Fundația Comunitară Bucureşti, TechSoup Romania, and Fundația GRASP.
